## Graduate Seminar (Winter 2026): Hannah Arendt's Jewish Writings

(RELIGST 777: Topics in Philosophy and Jewish Thought)

Instructor: Professor Dana Hollander

We will study some of Arendt's key writings on the linked themes of being-Jewish and antisemitism. These writings comprise her reflections, beginning in the 1930s, on the 18th–20th-century dynamics of Jewish "emancipation" and "assimilation"; the catastrophic end of those processes with the Nazi rise to power in 1933; the continued significance of antisemitism after 1945; and on Zionism.

Scheduled Meeting Time: Thursdays, 2:30–4:30 p.m. (flexible to suit needs of participants)\*\*



No prerequisites, open to students from any program or disciplinary background.

\*\*To allow for maximal flexibility, especially as I expect a couple of students to join us from York University, this seminar will be offered on a hybrid basis: To help us get to know each other, we will have a couple of in-person meetings at McMaster and possibly a meeting at York, but can hold most of the meetings on Zoom. I am open to student circumstances and preferences in this regard.

<u>Seminar Format</u>: Collaborative, text-based discussions on the primary readings. Students prepare one presentation, and write one Final Paper. For the Final Paper in this seminar, methodical engagement with our readings can serve as a pathway for grappling with contemporary debates on antisemitism, racism, and related topics; and/or with historical-cultural phenomena that factor into Arendt's deliberations in the works we will study, or that factor into contemporary engagements with Arendt's works.
